

Filling in Research Gaps on Women's and Children Health in Conflict Settings: A Focus on Epidemiology and Burden and Beyond

More data is needed on sexual, reproductive, maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health and nutrition (WCH) in conflict areas. There are also a number of challenges to collecting such data in conflict contexts, such as safety and security issues.

Below is a summary of next steps for key humanitarian actors to overcome data collection challenges and fill in gaps in the current landscape to better understand the epidemiology of WCH in conflict settings and the burden of conflict on these groups:



Develop innovative and nearreal-time reporting systems to enable a rapid response to the urgent needs for women, newborns, children and adolescents in conflict settings. Improving both the amount of data captured as well as the quality and relevance of the data.



Adapt or develop methods to collate and analyze information across existing routine information systems and from diverse information sources to address the needs of these populations, particularly those dispersed in non-camp settings for whom data is harder to obtain.



Consider task-sharing strategies that actively support aspects of research, alongside community-level implementation. Community volunteers could play an important role in data collection, monitoring and evaluation at the community-level.
